President's Message

A lot has happened over this past quarter.

Between upgrading our website, completing restoration projects, receiving historical donations, planning events like the Firefighters' Car Show and continued discussions on the acquisition of Old Fire Station One, we have been very, very busy.

First, I want to thank all the volunteers and San Jose Fire Museum (SJFM) Board Members that make this all possible -- week in and week out. The SJFM is busy, basically, every week of the year.

Visit our new, upgraded Museum website (www.sjfiremuseum.org) and you'll see the great work that our volunteer staff has done to improve its appearance and ease of use. This site is the primary way we get new and updated information out to all of our members and the public. A special "thank you" goes out to Jim Carter who led the way in this upgrade. The Museum Board felt it was critical to spend the time and money to keep the site current and fresh.

The Museum Board is also very excited as our latest restoration project nears completion. About a year ago, we made a trade with History San Jose. We gave them a 4-wheeled hay wagon that was in our collection in trade for a 4-wheeled Studebaker wagon. Both of these wagons were used in the 1870s through the early 1900s.

Shortly after this trade, a decision was made to restore the Studebaker wagon to represent the San Jose Fire Department's Relief Hose Company No. 5. This all-volunteer Company went in service in June, 1885. The Studebaker wagon is very similar in style to the original Relief Hose Wagon shown in the drawing on page 2 of this newsletter. When complete, the restoration will be a very close reproduction. We expect that this wagon will be ready for dis-



From the Restoration Shop

Let's Restore SJFD's Engine 1

In December, 1958 the City of San Jose received its first 1250-gpm pumper – a brand new, American LaFrance, 900 Series, cab-forward, fire engine. It was designated "Equipment No. 28" and it carried 500 gallons of water in its on-board tank. It replaced the 1937 American LaFrance fire engine which had served the City as Engine Company No. 1 for 21 years.

Equipment 28 served as Engine Company No. 1, running out of 201 N. Market Street, until 1975. At that time, it was put into service as Engine Company No. 3's Hose Wagon. After many years of reliable service, this classic American fire engine was put into reserve status in 1981.

The good news is that this piece of San Jose history has not been lost. The San Jose Fire Museum (SJFM) has Equipment No. 28 in our collection of over 30 vehicles, and the Board of Directors has made the decision to restore it. The main consideration for its restoration is not the condition of the rig, but finding the money to fund the project. After careful discussion with a number of trusted restoration experts, it was determined that it will cost approximately \$20,000 to completely restore. That is a hefty sum of money for our non-profit organization.

So, the SJFM is announcing with this article that we are starting a fund-raising program to restore Engine No. 1. The goal is to raise the \$20,000 within the next 12 to 24 months. So you can visualize the project, we have included with this article some pictures of Engine No. 1 as it looked when in it was in service at Fire Station No. 1 and as it appears today sitting in our warehouse.

Besides monetary donations, we are also looking for individuals who would like to manage this project and possibly do some of the restoration. Please contact the San Jose Fire Museum (info@simuseum.org) if you would like to participate.

During the last quarter, the Fire Museum received a great collection of photographs that were taken by the Engler brothers before they joined the SJFD. We have now added this donation to our Museum collection and thank them very much for the contribution. The photos capture images from many emergency responses that took place during the 1970s and 1980s. And, adding to their historical significance, many of the pictures are organized in albums and have captions or details included on the reverse side of the photos.

As this newsletter goes to press, the San Jose Firefighters' Car Show has just completed its 8th successful year. Despite a rare September rainfall, it was a huge success! The Car Show, and the upcoming SJFD Firefighters' Ball, are very important fund raising events for the SJFM and we need everyone's help by volunteering or making a donation.

Finally, we continue to work through different challenges in our quest to purchase Old Fire Station One. As we mentioned in our June newsletter, we are still in the application process for its inclusion in the National Registry. We are meeting with different individuals within the City and the County to help guide us through this acquisition process. In August, 2013, we submitted two letters to the Oversight Board -- the Successor Agency to the former San Jose Redevelopment Agency.

One of these letters was called a "Letter of Information". This was an official letter declaring as a priority our intent to purchase Old Fire Station One from the Successor Agency. We want the Agency to know that, when this asset goes out to bid, we intend to be the purchaser. We explained in the letter all the steps we are taking in preparing to purchase this Historic Landmark. In addition, we have asked the Successor Agency to complete an informal appraisal on Old Fire Station One -- which the San Jose Fire Museum has offered to fund.

The second letter we submitted was called a "Letter of Request". The purpose of this letter was to request temporary use of office and apparatus floor space located at Old Fire Station One. This space request would not impact the current tenant (Downtown

Ice) because they do not currently use this portion of the building. The space we are identifying is currently a storage area for the San Jose Fire Department and the Fire Museum. If this request is approved, the Fire Museum will not be inviting the public into this space. Rather, our request is for the sole purpose of presenting a small Fire Museum display to use as a marketing opportunity in our effort to reach out to potential partners and/or sponsors. The financial help of the private sector will be greatly needed when we begin to restore Old Fire Station One.

At this point in time, we are waiting for a response from the Successor Agency. Very shortly, though, we expect to have answers to a lot of questions about this project which will be reported to you in our December, 2013 newsletter.

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
