#### Important Apparatus Received

## "The Little Giant" Fire Engine Will **Become A Jewel In Our Collection**

The San Jose Fire Museum (SJFM) is very excited to announce that we have received a 1914 Little Giant chemical fire engine. The Jordan family gifted this beautiful, historic apparatus to us in August of last year.

Little Giant trucks were made by Chicago Pneumatic Tool Company from 1912 to 1917. Our Little Giant truck is a one-ton chassis with a 4 cylinder engine that was made in 1914 and converted into a fire engine a year later. Two pairs of soda-acid extinguishers were installed with a hose reel attached to each set. One set of tanks is located behind the driver and the other set is in the rear of the vehicle.

Many people think that a chemical fire engine was used to fight chemical fires. Not true. The word "chemical" in this case refers to the method used to create pressure in the water supply tank. A soda-acid extin-

guisher is comprised of a tank of water and a few pounds of baking soda. When a quart or more of sulfuric acid is added, a chemical reaction occurs and high pressure is created in the tank. This pressure moves water through the hose that is carried on the apparatus. This type of water delivery system for firefighting requires no pump.

This engine first served the town of Newark, Calif. in 1915 and was later moved to

"The Little Giant" Fire Engine on the day the Museum took delivery.

Russell City. Calif. after the city of Newark had hydrants installed. Russell City would later become the city of Hayward.

As a young man, the grandfather of the Jordan family fell in love with the Little Giant fire engine. In 1930, he purchased it at the age of 15. It was treasured all of his life and the Jordan family decided to donate it to the



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### San Jose Fire's Former Squad 11 To Undergo Total Restoration



When "Old Fire Station One" was originally opened in 1951, the station was staffed with an Engine, a Truck, and a Squad. The Squad was designated as "Squad 11" and, in later years, that designation became E101. The Squad responded to all structure fires in the city with a Battalion Chief, a Driver, and sometimes a Firefighter. One of the vehicles used in the early years was a 1953 GMC pumper. This was a common vehicle at the time and there were many scattered about the city of San Jose.

The San Jose Fire Museum currently is in possession of such an Engine. The Engine was discovered in a field in Gilroy several years ago. It was purchased from the owner for \$500 and has been in storage at the Fire Museum's Senter Rd. warehouse.

Capt. Gordon Wallace once served on Squad 11. He passed away last year and a memorial was held at the Fire Museum. It had been Captain Wallace's desire to have the old Engine fully restored to it's original glory.

The Wallace Family has generously donated a little over \$11,000 to restore Squad 11. But, additional funding is needed to complete the job. Donations may be made to the Museum specifically for Squad 11 work.

The museum will be restoring Squad 11 beginning in March. The restoration will take a couple of years and a lot of work will be required. Work on Squad 11 will occur at the museum warehouse on Thursdays and Fridays from 9 A.M. until 12 noon and your help would be greatly appreciated. No particular skill is required, just the desire to help us get Squad 11 back to once again looking good and running well.

We continue to make minor improvements at "Old Fire Station One". There are now 2 working bathrooms on the first floor and a security system is now in operation. And by the time you receive this newsletter, we will have a multi-camera video security system installed and operational. In addition, we have begun to set up a small museum display on the apparatus floor. Please drive by at night and you will see our Franklin Engine Co. No. 3 steamer all lit up in the front middle bay. It is the primary focal point of our exhibit for potential donors.

As you read this, we are in the middle of a Feasibility Study. This is a process to help us determine the financial potential of a Fire Museum located in downtown San Jose. The study will determine if there is an interest in the community for this type of museum and if there is a donation capacity to fund it.

The study includes over 35 interviews with key members of our South Bay Community. The interviews are confidential and are done by a Netzel Grigsby Associates, Inc. Consultant.
